Report of a Sustaining Improvement Inspection (Involving Action Short of Strike) in January 2020



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Sustaining Improvement Inspection of Bunscoil agus Naíscoil an tSléibhe Dhuibh, Béal Feirste, Contae Aontroma/County Antrim (104-6593)

Introduction

The previous inspection in February 2016 evaluated the overall effectiveness of Bunscoil agus Naíscoil an tSléibhe Dhuibh as having a high level of capacity for sustained improvement. A sustaining improvement inspection (SII) was conducted on 20 January 2020.

The trade unions which make up the Northern Ireland Teachers' Council (NITC) have declared industrial action primarily in relation to a pay dispute, and also workload and other management issues. The industrial action includes non-co-operation with the Education and Training Inspectorate (ETI). Prior to the inspection, the school informed the ETI that none of the teachers or leadership including governors would be co-operating with the inspection. The senior leadership co-operated with the inspection in relation to safeguarding responsibilities. The ETI has a statutory duty to monitor, inspect and report on the standards of education and professional practice among teachers under Article 102 of the Education and Libraries (Northern Ireland) Order 1986. Therefore, the inspection proceeded and the following evaluations are based on the evidence as made available at the time of the inspection.

Focus of the inspection

Owing to the school's participation in industrial action:

- the inspection was unable to focus on evaluating the extent to which the school is capable of demonstrating its capacity to effect improvement through self-evaluation and effective school planning; and
- a line of inquiry was not selected by the school from the development plan priorities.

Key findings

The children from year 6, who met with the inspectors, talked about the
wide range of learning and extra-curricular experiences available to them
and their appreciation, in particular, of the sporting, literacy and arts
opportunities they receive. They spoke confidently, fluently and with pride
about the Irish language and their ability to speak two languages.

The ETI was unable to evaluate fully:

- the line of inquiry; and
- the quality of learning and teaching within the classrooms.

Safeguarding

During the inspection, the school provided evidence that the arrangements for safeguarding children reflect broadly the guidance from the Department of Education. The children report that they feel safe in school and that they are aware of what to do if they have any concerns about their safety or welfare. They are secure in their knowledge about how to keep safe online. However, owing to the action short of strike, the ETI was unable to evaluate fully the outworking of the arrangements for safeguarding in the school.

Conclusion

Owing to the impact of the action short of strike being taken by the staff, the ETI is unable to assure parents/carers, the wider school community and stakeholders of the quality of education being provided for the children. The school is a high priority for future inspection with no further notice.

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
