

# Sustaining Improvement Inspection of St John's Business and Enterprise College, County Tyrone (223-0148)

### Introduction

The previous inspection in April 2014 evaluated the overall effectiveness of St John's Business and Enterprise College as very good<sup>1</sup>. A sustaining improvement inspection (SII) was conducted on 22 May 2017.

Four of the teaching unions which make up the Northern Ireland Teachers' Council (NITC) have declared industrial action primarily in relation to a pay dispute. This includes non-co-operation with the Education and Training Inspectorate (ETI). Prior to the inspection, the school informed the ETI that none of the teachers, including the principal, would be co-operating with the inspectors, except in relation to safeguarding. The ETI has a statutory duty to monitor, inspect and report on the quality of education under Article 102 of the Education and Libraries (Northern Ireland) Order 1986. Therefore, the inspection proceeded and the following evaluations are based on the evidence as made available at the time of the inspection.

### Focus of the inspection

Owing to the school's participation in industrial action:

- the inspection was unable to focus on evaluating the extent to which the school is capable of demonstrating its capacity to effect and sustain improvement through self-evaluation and effective school planning; and
- lines of enquiry were not selected by the school from the school development plan priorities.

### **Key findings**

• Due to the non-participation of the principal and teachers in the inspection process, no key findings can be reported.

### Safequarding

During the inspection, the school provided evidence that satisfactory arrangements for safeguarding reflect broadly the guidance issued by the relevant Departments. In discussions with inspectors, the pupils reported that they feel safe in school; they know what to do and who to talk to if they are concerned about their safety or well-being. However, owing to the action short of strike, the ETI was unable to evaluate fully, the outworking of the arrangements for safeguarding in the school.

### Conclusion

Owing to the impact of the action short of strike being taken by all of the teachers the ETI is unable to assure parents/carers, and the wider school community and stakeholders of the quality of education being provided for the pupils. The school is a high priority for future inspection with no further notice.
