Female Voices – an innovative approach to addressing sexism and misogyny in society through education

An exemplar of effective practice by the students of Our Lady and St Patrick's College, Knock

Context

The Female Voices Project began in September 2023, when a group of 19 students from Years 9 to 14 at Our Lady and St Patrick's College, Knock formed a project team to design and deliver an ambitious project. The aim of the project was to give rise to the female voice within the curriculum and to develop resources to facilitate conversations in schools around sexism and misogyny.

Baseline position

The final resource, which you can download below, is split into three strands, designed for each year of Key Stage 3.


Year 8 – Women in the Curriculum – Profiles of 15 inspirational women to inspire conversation and further research about the contribution of women to each subject area.
