

1. Introduction

Naíscoil Shliabh gCuilinn opened in 2009; it is situated in the Pastoral Centre in the village of Jonesborough, County Armagh. The naíscoil shares the accommodation with several other organisations and the staff are required to tidy away all furniture and equipment on a daily basis. A new part-time assistant was appointed in September 2012.

2. Inspection methods and evidence base

The inspection evaluations are based on evidence gained from in-class observations and from a range of documentation provided by the naíscoil.

The views of the parents, staff, and management group were sought through a confidential questionnaire prior to the inspection. Sixteen questionnaires were issued to the parents and eleven were returned with eight additional written comments. All of the staff and a small number of the management group also returned the questionnaires with written comments. All of the returns from the questionnaires indicated high levels of satisfaction with the work of the naíscoil. The reporting inspector shared the responses from the questionnaires with the staff and the members of the management group who attended the oral report back.

3. Overall finding of the inspection

In the areas inspected, the quality of education provided by this naíscoil is good; the naíscoil has important strengths in most of its educational and pastoral provision. The inspection has identified an area for improvement in the provision for learning which the naíscoil has demonstrated the capacity to address. The inspectorate will monitor the naíscoil's progress on the area for improvement.

KEY FINDINGS OF THE INSPECTION

4. Children's Achievements

The quality of the children's achievements is good.

- The children are very well-settled for the time of year and show good levels of independence and self-management.
- The children show a good understanding of, and respond well to, the Irish spoken to them by the staff.
- During the inspection, almost all of the children engaged in sustained, purposeful play. They demonstrate self-confidence and are learning to work both independently and as part of a group; they are learning to share and take turns.

5. **Provision for Learning**

The quality of the provision for learning is good.

- The quality of the arrangements for pastoral care in the naiscoil is very good. There is a happy, caring ethos within the naiscoil, which is evidenced by the effective working relationships at all levels and the exemplary behaviour displayed by all of the children.
- The staff work hard to create and maintain a bright, attractive, stimulating and clean learning environment in the playroom. The staff have appropriately identified the need to develop further the outdoor play area to ensure that the provision is broad and balanced.
- The staff have made a good start in developing a systematic approach to
 planning the curriculum and to observing the children at play. In order to meet
 the individual needs of all the children, they now need to develop this further by
 ensuring that their observations inform the assessment of the children's learning
 and that they influence future planning.
- The naiscoil staff give good attention to healthy eating and physical activity through the provision of a healthy snack, regular access to drinking water and the regular opportunities for energetic play.
- The staff work hard to create a language-rich environment and make effective
 use of songs and stories to support the children's acquisition of the Irish
 language. The quality of the staff's spoken Irish during the inspection was
 variable; the staff have identified appropriately the need to develop further their
 own competence in the Irish language.

6. **Leadership and Management**

The quality of leadership and management is good.

- The staff have begun to develop a culture of self-evaluation leading to improvement. There is a three-year development plan in place which has identified appropriate priorities for the future development of the naíscoil.
- The naiscoil staff are supported well by an early years' specialist (EYS) from ALTRAM, who has provided good, focused advice to the staff. She has acted as a good role model in effective immersion strategies and approaches.
- The naiscoil has developed effective links with parents through, for example, information evenings and monthly newsletters. Links have also been fostered with the local primary school and with the nearest bunscoil.
- On the basis of the evidence available at the time of the inspection, the naíscoil has comprehensive arrangements in place for safeguarding children. These arrangements reflect the guidance issued by the Department of Education.

CONCLUSION

In the areas inspected, the quality of education provided by this naíscoil is good; the naíscoil has important strengths in most of its educational and pastoral provision. The inspection has identified an area for improvement in the provision for learning which the naíscoil has demonstrated the capacity to address.

The area for improvement is:

• in order to meet the individual needs of all the children, the staff now need to ensure that their own observations inform their assessment of the children's learning and that they also influence future planning.

The Education and Training Inspectorate will monitor the naíscoil's progress in addressing the area for improvement.

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
