

#### 1. Introduction

St Comgall's Pre-school Education Centre is located in St Comgall's Parish Centre on Brunswick Road in Bangor, County Down. The playgroup was last inspected in November 2005.

#### 2. Inspection methods and evidence base

The inspection evaluations are based on evidence gained from in-class observations and from a range of documentation provided by the playgroup.

The views of the parents and staff were sought through a confidential questionnaire prior to the inspection. Eighteen of the parents (75 %) responded to the questionnaire; eleven of these parents made additional written comments. All of the responses from the parental questionnaires indicated a high level of satisfaction with the quality of the provision within the playgroup; in particular, the parents expressed their appreciation of the caring, approachable and supportive staff. The responses from the staff and management committee were also positive and supportive of the work of the playgroup.

#### 3. Overall finding of the inspection

In the areas inspected, the quality of education provided by this playgroup is very good. The playgroup is meeting very effectively the educational and pastoral needs of the children and has demonstrated its capacity for sustained self-improvement.

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#### KEY FINDINGS OF THE INSPECTION

#### 4. Children's achievements

- The children are very well settled and are developing positive attitudes to their learning.
- During the inspection, the children explored all areas of play freely and engaged in sustained, purposeful play across a range of activities.
- The children display high levels of independence and make very good use of the books and writing materials available throughout the playroom.
- The children's creative work and mark-making skills are very well developed.

#### 5. **Provision for learning**

The quality of the arrangements for pastoral care in the playgroup is very good.
The staff know the children well; they are caring and support the children well in
their play activities. There is a positive, friendly ethos throughout the setting; the
children's behaviour is exemplary.

- During the inspection, the quality of the interaction between the staff and the children was consistently very good. The staff model good play and develop the children's language and thinking skills through the use of open-ended questions.
- The staff have worked hard to create an attractive environment for the children; they make good use of the children's art work, appropriate posters and topical displays to enhance the playroom.
- The staff have developed a systematic approach to observing the children at play and to recording their responses. They use this information well to inform both their short -term planning for the activities provided and to meet the needs of individual children.
- The children are provided with a healthy snack and have opportunities for energetic physical play. The organisation of the physical play routine requires review in order to make better use of the time and space available.

#### 6. **Leadership and management**

- The staff have a very good team approach to the development work of the playgroup. They have made a good start to the process of self-evaluation and have identified areas for improvement in aspects of the playgroup's work. There is now a need for the staff and management committee to extend the evaluation process across all areas of the playgroup's work.
- The staff have developed good links with the parents. They keep them up to date with their child's progress and inform them about aspects of the provision and work of the playgroup through a regular, informative newsletter. The playgroup has developed good links with the local primary school.
- The independent early years specialist (EYS) provides good support for the playgroup staff. She now needs to help the staff to develop further the process of self-evaluation.
- On the basis of information available at the time of the inspection, the playgroup has comprehensive arrangements in place for safeguarding children. These arrangements reflect the guidance issued by the Department of Education.

#### CONCLUSION

In the areas inspected, the quality of education provided by this playgroup is very good. The playgroup is meeting very effectively the educational and pastoral needs of the children and has demonstrated its capacity for sustained self-improvement.

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
