SCHOOL CONTEXT

Killylea Primary School is situated in the village of Killylea, Co Armagh. Almost all of the children come from the local and surrounding rural area. The enrolment in recent years indicates an upward trend. At the time of the inspection, 15% of the children were entitled to free school meals and 16% of the children were identified as requiring additional support with aspects of their learning. In the Foundation Stage class there are two children below statutory school age for whom the school does not receive funding.

FOCUS

The inspection focused on:

- the children's achievements and standards in literacy and numeracy:
- the quality of provision for learning; and
- the quality of leadership and management.

THE VIEWS OF THE PARENTS, TEACHERS, GOVERNORS AND CHILDREN

The arrangements for the inspection included an opportunity for the parents and the teaching staff to complete a confidential questionnaire prior to the inspection, as well as meeting with a group of children from year 6. Forty questionnaires were issued to the parents of the primary school; 18% were returned to the Department of Education (DE) and two contained additional written comments. Most of the parental questionnaires indicated high levels of satisfaction with all aspects of school life. The very few areas of concern have been shared with the Principal. The teachers' responses were all very positive.

A representative from the Board of Governors (governors) met with the inspection team and expressed appreciation for the work of the Principal and the staff, the children's positive attitude to learning and the support and contribution of the parents, to the life and work of the school.

The year 6 children spoke with confidence about their experiences in school and know what to do if they have any worries or concerns.

PASTORAL CARE

The quality of the arrangements for pastoral care in the school is very good. Among the strengths are: the extent to which the school encourages and enables the parents to support the children in their education, the contribution made by all the staff to promote and maintain a well organised and supportive environment for learning, and the community ethos within the school.

CHILD PROTECTION

The school has very good comprehensive arrangements in place for safeguarding children. These arrangements reflect the guidance issued by the DE.

HEALTHY EATING AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

The school gives outstanding attention to promoting healthy eating and physical activity, for example through well-informed cookery lessons, a cycling to school policy and an award winning ECO Schools Project.

CONCLUSION

The strengths of the school include:

- the very good quality of the pastoral care;
- the quality of the teaching observed during the inspection, which was consistently very good and on occasions outstanding;
- the good standards attained by most of the children in literacy and numeracy and the enhanced learning experiences through the use of information and communication technology;
- the very good processes established for self-evaluation which inform school development planning;
- the teaching and support staff who work well as a team to meet the needs of all the children;
- the very good leadership of the Principal whose vision sets the tone for the work of the school.

It will be important that the employing authority, school governors and the staff plan for, and manage, issues related to the sustainability of the school provision and school budget, in order to address the current and future needs of the children and the staff.

In the areas inspected, the quality of the education provided by this school is very good. The school is meeting very effectively the educational and pastoral needs of the learners; and has demonstrated its capacity for sustained self-improvement.

In this report, proportions may be described as percentages, common fractions and in more general quantitative terms. Where more general terms are used, they should be interpreted as follows:
