LONGSTONE PRIMARY SCHOOL, AHOGHILL, BALLYMENA, CO ANTRIM, BT42 2PN (301-0466)

Longstone Primary School is situated three miles from the village of Ahoghill in County Antrim. All of the children come from the surrounding rural area. The enrolment has declined over recent years and is currently 52. At the time of the inspection, 15% of the children were entitled to receive free school meals and 13% of the children were identified as requiring additional support with aspects of their learning.

The arrangements for the inspection included the opportunity for the parents and teachers to complete a confidential questionnaire prior to the inspection, as well as meetings with groups of children from years 6 and 7. Thirty families were issued with questionnaires; 63% were returned to the Department of Education of which 12 contained additional written comments. The majority of the responses from the parental questionnaires indicated a high level of satisfaction with the life and work of the school highlighting, in particular, the friendly, helpful and caring teachers. The responses from the teachers were very affirmative of the work of the school. The children talked enthusiastically about their enjoyment of school and reported that they feel safe and secure and know what to do in the event of a concern. The issues raised by a minority of the parents through the questionnaires and the written comments were shared with the Principal.

The quality of the arrangements for pastoral care in the school is very good. This is evident through the child centred ethos, the quality of the working relationships throughout the school and the celebration of the children's achievements.

The school has satisfactory arrangements in place for safeguarding children. These arrangements reflect broadly the guidance issued by the relevant Department but the following minor area needs to be addressed: to update the training for new staff.

The school gives very good attention to promoting healthy eating and physical activity, for example the promotion of Healthy Breaks Weeks and the distribution of a Healthy Snacks Recipe Booklet, all of which encourage the children to adopt healthy lifestyles.

The strengths of the school include:

- the good levels of engagement and motivation displayed by the children in their learning;
- the quality of the teaching observed which was always good or better, with almost one-third being outstanding;
- the good standards achieved by most of the children in numeracy and literacy;
- the very good provision made for the children with special educational needs;
- the good progress made in developing a culture of self-evaluation to inform school development planning; and
- the very good leadership of the Principal, ably supported by the staff.

The area for improvement is:

• the need to develop further the assessment strategies used across the school to inform more effectively the quality of learning and teaching.

In the areas inspected, the quality of education provided by the school is good. The school has important strengths in most of its educational and pastoral provision. The inspection has identified an area for improvement which the school has demonstrated the capacity to address.

The Education and Training Inspectorate will monitor the school's progress on the area for improvement.

It will be important that the employing authority, governors and staff plan for, and manage, issues related to the sustainability of the school provision and school budget, in order to address the current and future needs of the children and the staff.
