SCHOOL CONTEXT

Straidhavern Primary School is situated at Nutt's Corner, Crumlin in County Antrim. Most of the children are from the local area. The enrolment in recent years has fluctuated and now stands at 61. At the time of the inspection, 6% of the children were entitled to free school meals and almost 16% of the children were identified as requiring additional support with aspects of their learning.

FOCUS

The inspection focused on:

- the children's achievements and standards in literacy and numeracy;
- the quality of provision for learning; and
- the quality of leadership and management.

THE VIEWS OF THE PARENTS, TEACHERS, GOVERNORS AND CHILDREN

The arrangements for the inspection included an opportunity for the parents and the teaching staff to complete confidential questionnaires prior to the inspection. Of the 46 questionnaires issued to the parents, 18 (39%) were returned to the Department of Education (DE) and eight contained additional written comments. All of the parental responses were highly affirmative, indicating very strong support for the work and life of the school and highlighting, in particular, the support given to the children with special educational needs and the caring ethos within the school. The teachers' responses were all very positive, commenting on the school's value within the local community.

A representative from the Board of Governors (governors) met with the inspection team on the first day of the inspection and expressed his appreciation for the work of the Principal and the staff, the children's positive attitude to learning and being well-informed about the school development planning process.

The inspectors also met with a group of year 6 and 7 children; they talked positively about the care provided by the staff, and their involvement in a range of after-school activities. They reported that they are aware of what to do if they have any concerns about their safety or well-being.

PASTORAL CARE

The quality of the arrangements for pastoral care in the school is very good. Among the strengths are: the exemplary behaviour of the children who exhibit a clear sense of loyalty to the school; the contribution made by the staff to promote a supportive and inclusive environment for learning; and the community ethos evident within the school.

CHILD PROTECTION

The school has very good comprehensive arrangements in place for safeguarding children. These arrangements reflect the guidance issued by DE.

HEALTHY EATING AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

The school gives very good attention to promoting healthy eating and physical activity through, for example, the provision of the healthy break scheme and appropriate consultation carried out with the children which encourage them to adopt healthy lifestyles.

CONCLUSION

The strengths of the school include:

- the good standards attained by the majority of the children in literacy and numeracy;
- the quality of the teaching, which was good or very good in most of the lessons observed;
- the well-embedded culture of self-evaluation which informs the school development planning process;
- the very good quality of the pastoral care provision;
- the quality of the provision for the children who require additional support in their learning; and
- the enthusiastic and effective leadership of the Principal whose commitment to school improvement sets the tone for the work of the school.

An area for improvement is:

• the need for the staff to work more collaboratively together to ensure greater consistency in the development of numeracy across the school.

In the areas inspected, the quality of the education provided by this school is good. The school has important strengths in most of its educational and pastoral provision. The inspection has identified an area for improvement which the school has demonstrated the capacity to address. The Education and Training Inspectorate will monitor the school's progress on the area for improvement.

It will be important that the employing authority, governors and the staff plan for, and manage, issues related to the sustainability of the school provision and school budget, in order to address the current and future needs of the children and the staff.

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
